GET CONSENT THE ABSENCE OF A YES IS A NO



CREATING CONSENT CULTURE LOOKS LIKE:

In a culture of consent, the fact that consent is mandatory is normalized, respected and valued in society. It is an expression of values and attitudes that respects bodily autonomy and understands that each person is always the best judge of their own wants and needs. It is a culture in which all interactions and relationships are centered on **FREELY GIVEN**, ACTIVE, **RESPECTFUL**, and **ENTHUSIASTIC MUTUAL AGREEMENT** for participation.¹

WHAT IS SEXUAL CONSENT?

Canadian Law states that there has to be an affirmative "yes" - or voluntary agreement - to engage in sexual activity.

Sexual assault occurs when consent is absent and it is a criminal offence. This means that consent must be an active process, without the influence of coercion. One should never assume consent.²

Freely given.

Doing something sexual with someone is a decision that should be made without pressure, force, manipulation, or while drunk or high.

Reversible.

Anyone can change their mind about what they want to do, at any time. Even if you've done it before or are in the middle of having sex.

Informed.

Be honest. For example, if someone says they'll use a condom and then they don't, that's not consent.

Enthusiastic.

If someone isn't excited, or really into it, that's not consent.

Specific.

Saying yes to one thing (like going to the bedroom to make out) doesn't mean they've said yes to others (like oral sex).

WHAT IS SEXUAL VIOLENCE?

As per Western's Policy on Sexual Violence, sexual violence means any sexual act or act targeting a person's sexuality, gender identity and gender expression, whether the act is physical or psychological in nature, that is committed, threatened or attempted against a person without the person's consent, and includes sexual assault, sexual harassment, stalking, indecent exposure, voyeurism, cyber harassment and sexual exploitation.⁴

INTERSECTIONALITY AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE

It's crucial to recognize that individuals with intersecting marginalized social identities -that include but are not limited to women, trans and gender nonconforming people, queer people, people of colour and racialized people, Indigenous Peoples, people with lower socioeconomic status, and people living with disabilities — are disproportionately impacted by sexual violence.⁵

- ii. For Every 1000 Sexual Assaults, Only 33 Are Ever Reported To The Police;
- iii. 12 Result In Charges Laid; 1. Only 6 Are Prosecuted and
 - 2. Only 3 Lead To A Conviction.

SURVIVOR-CENTRIC RESPONSE

If someone discloses an experience of sexual violence to you, follow these steps in order to ensure are taking a survivor-centric approach*:

- 1. Provide a safe and comfortable space to talk and listen
- 2. Clearly communicate any limits to confidentiality This allows the speaker to make an informed choice about whether to continue with the disclosure, and how much information to share.
- 3. Listen with empathy and patience
- 4. Support the individual to make their own decisions
- 5. Validate and acknowledge the person's experience with statements like "I believe you"
- 6. Provide information and resources while recognizing your limitations You don't need to be an expert. Admit when you're not sure how to proceed by offering to search relevant websites.
- 7. Take care of yourself

*Survivor centric means you are prioritizing the rights, needs, and wishes of the survivor in your response.
